

The parable of the Fig tree on the stained glass in St Mary Abbot's church on Kensington High Street

Two examples are given by Jesus today when talking about sin and suffering in our world.

Firstly, he speaks of the time Pilate constructed a much needed aqueduct for Jerusalem, with many people outraged at his use of sacred money to build it. So Pilate instructed his soldiers to mingle amongst the crowd with clubs hidden beneath their cloaks. Their job was to beat the Galileans into submission. A task they took on with such enthusiasm, that many were killed. The ones who were killed, says Jesus, weren't necessarily more wicked than those who lived.

In the second example, Jesus tells the parable of the fig tree. The Book of Revelation compares the falling of the stars from the sky at the end of the world, with the falling of the figs from this tree. The fig tree in this story is a reminder of the two kinds of human being: those who give and those who take. Those who only take have to justify their existence. To accept Christ's message is to be open to conversion.

REFLECT

arch 19th is the day we celebrated one of the great Saints in our Church, St. Joseph. He was the consistent presence in the background of the Gospels, where Jesus found his home, his stability, his growth and learning and wisdom. Joseph the silent worker, preaching by his actions, preaching by his simple presence.

Francis of Assisi once invited a young friar to go with him into town to preach. Francis and the young friar spent all day walking through the streets and then came home. When the day's journey was done, the young friar was disappointed and asked "Weren't we supposed to preach today?" Francis replied, "Son, we have preached. We were preaching while we were walking. We were seen by many and our behaviour was noted. It is of no use walking anywhere to preach unless we preach wherever as we walk!" He summed up his idea in these words. "Preach the Gospel everywhere, and if necessary, use words." To him witnessing to Jesus wasn't merely quoting some words out of the Bible from time to time but one who lives by the word of God each day.

The gardener in the Gospel asked the owner of the vineyard to give the barren fig tree another chance to produce fruit. He promised to dig around it and manure it, to give it one last chance to prove itself. It suggests that we too need to nurture our faith and commit ourselves to being helpful to the lives of others.

Perhaps like St. Joseph, we're that simple presence – offering hope and comfort and love to those around us.

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Lord, if we possessed a part of the patience that you give to us, then this world would be transformed.

Third Sunday of Lent - 23rd March 2025

In the early years of the seventeeth century John Donne, of recusant Catholic stock and later an Anglican clergyman, married Ann, the daughter of Sir George More of Loseley Park. His *Holy Sonnet 14*, penned not many years later is amongst the poems provided in the liturgy of the hours for the season of Lent.

This Sunday the liturgy urges us to the work of repentance – of turning away from sin and earthly things (the lesser goods of this world) and setting our hearts on God and the things of heaven. The parable of the fig tree teaches us that an opportunity is there for us ('now is the favourable time') but that we should not hang around. Paul, writing to the Christians of Corinth, urges them not to rest on their laurels and take things for granted. In the coming weeks we will hear a reassurance of mercy, but this week we are confronted by the urgency of the work of conversion.

Donne's sonnet recognises how hard conversion and true repentance can be. We are reluctant to let go of what we know, even if we sense that it might not be good for us, or that it is getting in the way of something so much better. Perhaps in our prayer this week we might simply pray for God's help to rely on him more deeply.

Batter my heart, three-person'd God, for you As yet but knock, breathe, shine, and seek to mend; That I may rise and stand, o'erthrow me, and bend Your force to break, blow, burn, and make me new.

I, like an usurp'd town to another due, Labor to admit you, but oh, to no end; Reason, your viceroy in me, me should defend, But is captiv'd, and proves weak or untrue. Yet dearly I love you, and would be lov'd fain, But am betroth'd unto your enemy;

A reading from the Book of Exodus.

In those days: Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law, Jethro, the priest of Midian, and he led his flock to the west side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. And the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a flame of fire out of the midst of a bush. He looked, and behold, the bush was burning, yet it was not consumed. And Moses said, 'I will turn aside to see this great sight, why the bush is not burned.' When the Lord saw that he turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, 'Moses, Moses!' And he said, 'Here I am.' Then he said, 'Do not come near; take your sandals off your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground.' And he said, 'I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob.' And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God.

Then the Lord said, 'I have surely seen the affliction of my people who are in Egypt and have heard their cry because of their taskmasters. I know their sufferings, and I have come down to deliver them out of the hand of the Egyptians and to bring them up out of that land to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk and honey.'

Then Moses said to God, 'If I come to the people of Israel and say to them, "The God of your fathers has sent me to you", and they ask me, "What is his name?" what shall I say to them?' God said to Moses, 'I AM WHO I AM.' And he said, 'Say this to the people of Israel: "I AM has sent me to you."' God also said to Moses, 'Say this to the people of Israel: "The Lord, the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you." This is my name for ever, and thus I am to be remembered throughout all generations.'

And he answered him, "Sir, let it alone this year also, until I dig round it and put on manure. Then if it should bear fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down.""
