THE GOLDEN RULE

LUKE 6:27-38

Today's Gospel is from Jesus' Sermon on the Plain, Luke's version of Matthew's Sermon on the Mount. It is Jesus' vision for how his disciples are to live.

There are two major themes in the section we read today. The first is a teaching on love of enemies. The second is a call to imitate the compassion of God the Father.

Jesus gives four practical examples of love of enemy. The first is how to respond to verbal abuse. If someone curses a disciple of Jesus, they should not meet it with another curse but with a blessing, perhaps even with a word of praise. When they are treated badly, they should respond by praying for those who mistreat them. When it comes to physical ill-treatment, if struck on the cheek, they must not retaliate but turn the other cheek.

The third area has to do with property. Jesus begins with an example – the theft of one's clothes. Clothing in his time was relatively simple. Underwear consisted of a strip of cloth used as a loin-cloth. Over this was worn a light garment, like a long tunic or shirt, tied at the waist with a belt or sash so that the loose ends could be tucked up when at work. In cold weather or when travelling, a heavier

woollen cloak was worn that could double as a blanket when required. If a robber demanded the cloak, the disciple was not to fight to retain it but to offer even the tunic as well.

The fourth example concerns borrowing and lending. Disciples are to give to anyone who asks and not even to expect the return of stolen property.

Now Luke gives what has been called 'the Golden Rule' – treat others as you would like them to treat you. This teaching is not exclusive to Christianity. Rabbis, even before Jesus' time, taught a version of it. It was known to religious teachers in China and India, and to philosophers in Greece and elsewhere. It is probably the highest pinnacle of human wisdom and its common sense cannot be doubted.

But Jesus' teaching goes a step beyond it. The call is not so much to treat people in the way you expect to be treated but to reach into God's utter compassion for God's creation and to imitate that. Everything Jesus said and did was a living out, a repetition, of the Golden Rule. Imagine the kind of world we would have, and the relationship between peoples and nations that would exist, if we all lived according to the Golden Rule.

DO

Reflect on today's Gospel. If you were in court and this Gospel was a charge sheet assessing how successful you are at following Jesus, what would the verdict be?



PRAY

Pray for an increase of harmony between peoples and nations, for an end to violence and conflict.

SAY

"Lord, help me to live by your Golden Rule. When I fail, help me to pick up the pieces. Amen."

LEARN

The Christian must live by the Golden Rule: Treat others as you would like them to treat you.

REFLECT

o live according to the Golden Rule is not easy, as we know. The vision of Jesus is at odds with how the world operates. It turns the standard way of behaving upside down. For all the progress humankind has made, for all our advances in technology and science, for all our development in human rights, we still have a lot of evolving to do if we are to live like

Eight decades after the Holocaust, antisemitism is increasing again, especially after the war in Gaza. In Ireland, more than half of immigrants say they experienced racism in the past year.

Today, there are more displaced people than at any time since the Second World War, while millions of women are trafficked into sex slavery annually. Bullying, domestic violence, homophobia all remain as rampant

as ever. Social media has facilitated an explosion of hate speech. To adopt Jesus' vision is to change how we behave. It is to treat everyone as we would like to be treated.

Second, Jesus asks us to keep returning to his vision, to never give up. Of course, we will fail. Of course, we will behave in shameful ways. Of course, we will rush to judge and to condemn and treat badly. We do these things because we are human, after all. We give into selfishness, anger and tribalism because we are frail, broken and imperfect. But Jesus knows this. The challenge is to brush ourselves clean every time we fail. To never give up trying to live his way.

In the 1980s, civil war raged in Nicaragua. The left-wing Sandinistas eventually claimed power. The Sandinistas had a lot of support in the Church from those who believed the Church should be actively on the side of the poor. One Sandinista

government minister was a Catholic priest, Fr Ernesto Cardenal. The Vatican disapproved of his political activism, and when the Pope visited Nicaragua in 1984, a famous photograph shows him wagging his finger at Cardenal, who is kneeling before him for his blessing. Cardenal's faculties were removed, and he could no longer function as a priest.

Fast forward to 2019 and another photograph. This time, Cardenal, now 94, is in a hospital bed. He is dressed in priestly garments and is celebrating Mass. Pope Francis has restored his priestly faculties, treated him with compassion. In the photograph, the old man is at peace. Happy.

The message of Jesus in today's Gospel is clear: let love be our guiding motive; let mercy dictate all we do; treat others as we would like to be treated. Seek, like Jesus, to turn our broken world upside down.

Be merciful as your heavenly Father is merciful

Jesus taught his disciples: "Be merciful, even as your Father is merciful". It is a responsibility that challenges the conscience and actions of every Christian. In fact, it is not enough to experience God's mercy in one's life; whoever receives it must also become a sign and instrument for others. Mercy, therefore, is not only reserved for particular moments, but it embraces our entire daily existence.

How can we, therefore, be witnesses of mercy? We do not think that it is done with great efforts or superhuman actions. No, it is not so. The Lord shows us a very simple path, made by small actions which, nonetheless, have great value in his eyes, to the extent to which he has told us that it is by these actions we will be judged. In fact, one of the most beautiful pages from Matthew's Gospel brings us the lesson which we can, in every way, hold to be true as the "testament of Jesus" by the Evangelist, who had experienced the action of Mercy directly on himself. Jesus says that every time we give food to the hungry and drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked and welcome the foreigner, visit the sick or imprisoned, we do the same to him. The Church calls these actions "corporal works of mercy", because they assist people with their material necessities.

There are also, however, seven other works of mercy called "spiritual", which pertain to other equally important needs, especially today, because they touch the person's soul, and often create the greatest suffering. We certainly remember a phrase which has entered into the common language: "Bear wrongs patiently". And there are; there are troublesome people! It might seem like a minor thing which makes us smile, but instead contains a feeling of profound charity; it is the same for the other six [spiritual works of mercy], which are good to remember: counsel the doubtful, instruct the ignorant, admonish sinners, console the afflicted, pardon offences, pray to God for the living and the dead. These are daily things! "But I am afflicted..." — "But God will help you, I don't have time...". No! I stop myself, I listen, I give my time and console him; that is an act of mercy, and it is done not only to him, it is done to Jesus!...

I am convinced that, through these simple, daily actions, we can achieve a true cultural revolution, like there was in the past. If every one of us, every day, does one of these, this will be a revolution in the world! Everyone, each and every one of us. How many Saints are remembered even today, not for the great works which they accomplished, but for the charity which they knew how to impart!... These works of mercy are the features of the face of Jesus Christ, who takes care of his littlest brethren in order to bring the tenderness and closeness of God to each of them. May the Holy Spirit help us; may the Holy Spirit kindle within us the desire to live this way of life: at least once a day, at least! Let us again learn the corporal and spiritual works of mercy by heart, and ask the Lord to help us put them into practice every day, and in those moments where we see Jesus in a person who is in need. 'If you love those who love you, what benefit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what benefit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. And if you lend to those from whom you expect to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to get back the same amount. But love your enemies, and do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return, and your reward will be great, and you will be sons of the Most High, for he is kind to the ungrateful and the evil.

'Be merciful, even as your Father is merciful. Judge not, and you will not be judged; condemn not, and you will not be condemned; forgive, and you will be forgiven. Give, and it will be given to you; good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap. For with the measure you use it will be measured back to you.'
